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From the Cantor's Desk . . .

It's officially Spring – Aviv- (notwithstanding the sub-freezing overnight temps!). There is something so uplifting when the brown grass starts turning green (and before you have to worry about mowing), buds coming out of what seem like dead sticks and the sound of bird song through the windows.

Spring signifies renewal and rebirth in many cultures and in our human psychology. For Jews, it is also signals the coming of Pesach – the holiday that celebrates our liberation from slavery and the start of our "nationhood." But what does that mean to us today as Americans and Jews? From the time of the final expulsion of the Israelites from Israel in 70 CE, Jews have been the "other" in many lands, second class citizens or not citizens at all, but sometimes tolerated aliens – when it was advantageous to the ruling power for some selfish reason. That changed in the United States. While subject to prejudice, discrimination and violent attacks, and limitations on immigration from the 1920s to today, at a time when it could be argued, the Jews' need for asylum as refuges was most needed, once, here, Jews have had full rights of citizenship and opportunities unparalleled anywhere else up to that time. American Jews are loyal to the United States, our homeland. And American Jews have varying levels of connection to the state of Israel, from fierce loyalty (especially from those of us who lived through WWII or were raised in the shadow of its conclusion), to no connection at all (especially among younger members who only see the technical and military powerhouse of today's state with no sense of awe at how unlikely it was that this would be where we are today).

As we make preparations to celebrate our freedom once again, I exhort us to keep in mind how fragile that freedom may be. Our sages taught that the exile from Jerusalem and destruction of the temple came from the baseless hatred among the Jews of the time. That included zealotry in trying to enforce an orthodoxy of thought and practice and cruelty to those who thought differently. The Rabbinic tradition that expanded after the exile developed from a debate of ideas, with the debate as well as the minority opinion being preserved and passed down through the ages. Judaism is not a practice of orthodoxy of thought (even among the orthodox). It has been and should continue to be what I have heard referred to as "orthopraxy." What we DO matters more than what we think, and we need to preserve the ability of people to think as individuals, to be able to exchange ideas with those who may disagree without fear of government reprisal.

This Pesach, please commit to DO something (even if you do not keep kosher normally) to reinforce the importance of FREEDOM in your heritage, Jewish and American. Attend a Seder, do not eat bread or grain products for the week (you can live without them, honestly), avoid foods that could never be kosher (shellfish, pork, cheeseburgers). Do it for yourself, as a reminder of the freedoms we enjoy and our ability to make these decisions. And maybe, listen to a podcast or news program or read an article from the "other" side.

Wishing you all a Freilich Pesach – Chag Hamatzot Sameach.

FOOD, DISHES, UTENSILS - USED DURING PESACH

Forbidden For Use— The following foods are forbidden for use during Pesach: leavened bread, cakes, biscuits and crackers, cereals, coffee substances derived from cereals, wheat, barley, oats, peas and dry beans and all liquids which contain ingredients made from grain alcohol.

<u>Permitted Foods</u>— Requiring no "Kosher L'Pesach label: The following foods are permitted in unopened packages or containers: natural coffee, sugar, tea, salt, pepper, milk, vegetables (except peas and beans - string beans being permitted).

(b)If certified for Passover use by Rabbinical Authority— Matzot, matzoh flour, Passover noodles, candies, cakes, beverages, canned and processed foods, butter, jams, cheese, jellies, relishes, dried fruits and vegetables, salad oil, vegetable gelatin, shortenings, vinegar, wines and liquors are permitted if they are certified by competent, trustworthy rabbinical authority. Labels and tags marked "Kosher L' Pesach" are of no value unless they bear a rabbinical signature.

AUTHORIZATION FOR SALE OF CHAMETZ

NOTE: If possible, all Chametz – food not acceptable during Pesah (Passover), or materials containing such unacceptable food – should be destroyed or given away before the holiday begins. Should this be impossible, the hametz may be stored in such a way that we are sure not to use it during the holiday and its actual ownership is transferred to a non-Jew until the holiday ends. **Please complete the form below and return no later than Thursday April 10th.**

I, the undersigned, fully empower and permit Cantor Okoshi to act in my behalf to sell all hametz possessed by me – knowingly or unknowingly – as defined by Torah and rabbinic law, and to lease all places wherein hametz owned may be found. This transaction will be in effect for the duration of **Pesah**, which this year begins at sundown on Saturday, April 12th and concludes at sundown on Sunday, April 20th.
