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From the Cantor's Desk ...

We just completed the holiday of Passover – *zman cheiruteinu*—the time of our freedom and we are literally counting the days to Shavuot, our next major festival when we celebrate the gift of the Torah. The Torah admonishes us to remember that we were slaves in Egypt, that we were strangers in a strange land, and therefore we must welcome the stranger, take care of those less fortunate than ourselves and pursue justice. The extent to which any given community or society, Jewish or secular, fulfills these commandments may certainly be debated and there will be many examples that make us proud or make us shudder.

In my lifetime, regardless of who has been in office, I have felt fortunate to be an American and lucky that my grandparents were able to immigrate to this country in the early 20^{th} century. All four of my grandparents came from different parts of the "pale of settlement" in the Russian empire. They came here poor, to escape discrimination and violence in their shtetls, and built lives, had children, grandchildren and great grandchildren. Other members of their family left for other parts of the world, including, as far as I know, South Africa, Brazil and Israel. Any of their siblings or family that did not leave, no longer exist, having been lost in the years between 1939 and 1945.

Despite anti-semitism, quotas, exclusionary practices and other trials, we Jews have flourished in America. The rights afforded to all persons under our Constitution to various freedoms, such as freedom of expression, no unwarranted search and seizure, due process, separation of church and state, have allowed us, as well as other ethnic and religious groups to make our way and contribute to the building of this nation. These freedoms are not always comfortable to defend when the speech or expression of someone else is offensive to us. Over time, the boundaries of such freedoms have been tested, fine-tuned and defined by courts and legislatures, but have remained. It is because of my pride and faith in our American system (flaws and all) that I am so dismayed by certain actions of the current administration that ride roughshod over freedom of expression – including the press, academics, conscious, public and private attorneys – and imposing punishments on these people and institutions, as well as immigrants, whether here legally or undocumented, without any due process at all.

I feel very strongly that this is not a "left" or "right" issue. Our government should absolutely prosecute institutions that failed to protect Jews, just as they should prosecute violations of anyone's civil rights and other law violations. However, our system of government leaves the interpretation of these laws to courts. Whether our families arrived in this country in the 17th century or the 21st century, we all benefit from the fact that there is no monarch or dictator here with whom we might fall out of favor. We should all be concerned with the actions of our government that have "disappeared" people, revoked "refugee," "parolee," "student" status for so many without warning and has barred attorneys from "access to federal buildings" (despite federal courts being federal buildings, and the freedom to lobby, or speak to our representatives is part of our freedom of expression).

Regardless of any other policy view – tariffs are good, tariffs are terrible; government is necessary and does good, government is just bloated with fraud and abuse"; "we need immigrant workers, immigrants are stealing our jobs and weighing us down" – as a minority in this country, I feel that we must stand for fairness of process, freedom of conscience and expression and support those that are fighting to maintain these freedoms so that we can continue to live here in pride and safety.



LEBANON TRANSIT SENIOR SHARED RIDE PROGRAM

Lebanon Transit offers a Shared Ride service. In most cases you will ride with others, and other passengers may be picked up and dropped off before you reach your destination. The trip may take longer than if you were going by yourself and you should plan accordingly.

The service provided is "curb-to-curb," and all Shared Ride vehicles are equipped with wheelchair lifts. Drivers will assist passengers on and off vehicles, as needed. Travel for any purpose inside Lebanon County or to medical appointments at Hershey Medical Center campus.

You must be registered with the Shared Ride Program before using our services, and advanced reservations are required.

Persons aged 65+ can sign-up for a free Senior Citizen Lottery Funded ID Card to receive a reduced fare for Shared Ride services.
