From the Cantor's Desk...

Who's on your "TO CALL" list?

I know there are some of you to whom this does not apply, but if you're like me, the demands of everyday life overtake us, and I forget to connect with the people I am thinking about. Then when I get a quiet moment, I find it difficult to actually dial the phone. All kinds of "stories" go through my head – the person is busy. I haven't spoken to them for so long, it'll be weird. They don't really want to hear from me. We won't have anything to talk about. In almost every case, when I finally make the call, all those thoughts are just what I called them above – "stories." Stories that I made up myself from my own anxieties, and instead I have had some wonderful conversations and hang up feeling happier, even if the call was a "consolation" call, or something that was on my "should" list – you know those things we berate ourselves for NOT doing. (I should eat healthier. I should exercise. I should clean out my basement. etc.)

In our current technological age, it seems that a text or message on an app could substitute for these "old school" conversations. As our world becomes more disconnected and dominated by tech algorithms, the days of MY youth, when we'd come home from school and immediately call a friend on the telephone -- choosing the one with the cord long enough that we could take it to a room with a door -- and then spend hours tying up the house phone line.

A story in the Talmud explains a saying "Friendship or death." (Taanit 23a) presupposed to be a popular proverb of the time. In the story, there was a wise scholar named Choni Hama'agal who inexplicably fell asleep for 70 years. When he awoke, two generations had passed and no one recognized him, although they still referred to the great wisdom of the famous "Choni Hama'agal" in the study houses. When he protested that it was indeed he, Choni, everyone attributed this to mental illness. Finding himself completely alone, he prayed to die.

The truth is, we are all alone – unless we make the effort to reach out. By reaching out, we rewrite the story. Now it can be not a work of fiction, but a record of history. And what's the worst that can happen? The person you call may just say thank you, or not pick up. On the other hand, you may ignite that special spiritual spark that comes from feeling part of a community. And that spark can light up the person you called and yourself.

So, who's on your "to call" list? Make the call.


